


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Report of the Secretary of the Board of Stock Commissioners

For the Year Ending Dec. 31, 1913	
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Hon. S. V. Stewart, Governor. Helena, Montana

Dear Sir:

During the year 1913, the stockmen of Montana have received the proceeds of 179,886 head of cattle and 27,682 head of horses. The shipments this year of cattle were about 9,000 head short of the shipments of 1912. This shortage is expected and has many times been explained by the influx of settlers. It is expected that the homesteader will, in a small way, become a stockman; that he is doing so, is proven by the records of recording brands in this office during the past year. We have recorded 6,618 brands, the largest number in the history of the office during any given year.

The production of beef has always been one of the important industries of Montana. It necessarily will continue to be so. It is admitted by all who are familiar with conditions that we are at the low ebb of cattle production. During the year 1913, Montana has exported approximately 180,000 head of cattle. This number is lower than for many years past. When, however, we realize that our population has been increasing very rapidly, and therefore, our own consumption increasing proportionately, it seems reasonable to believe that the number of cattle in the State has not decreased to any great extent during the past year of two.

Prior to 1911, the large herds were decreased very rapidly, but the small farmer and homesteader have been increasing their holdings in livestock. There has been an enormous influx of settlers and it is seldom that you find them without some stock. They are increasing the number as fast as their financial condition and land holdings will allow. It is the small ranchman with from ten to a hundred head of cattle who is going to increase the cattle census of the State.

One need only turn to the shipments from Montana to find that the ranchman is increasing his herd. The Chicago receipts of calves shipped form Montana in 1911 was practically five thousand head; in 1912, it was only one thousand head. This shows that we are allowing our calves to mature and were we able to get exact figures on heifers and young cows shipped, we would find the same proportion of decrease in shipments; therefore, Montana is today exporting only her mature cattle and saving her breeding stock. This is very natural when we consider the prospective prices of beef and at the same time consider the possibility of Montana's supporting many more cattle than she has at present.

We have been known as a cattle state. It is true we have been a large factor in the western beef supply. We have taken advantage of the possibilities of stock raising as they appeared, but are there not latent possibilities that we do not realize? Is there not some way of increasing the ranges of Montana or of conserving the grazing lands of Montana, so that they will support much more livestock than at present? We have the natural forage or we did have it before the indiscriminate use of the public lands decreased their productiveness. Why

is it that the state of New York, which is approximately one-third of the size of Montana, has three times as many cattle as Montana? Come further west and use Nebraska in our comparison. Nebraska, about one-half the size of Montana, has three times as many cattle. Again, compare Montana with the very mountainous state of Colorado and find that where Colorado has two acres of land Montana has three but she has three head of cattle where we have two.

These figures would lead one to suppose that our lands are not as good as the states cited but a little investigation will show that Montana holds the record in the production per acre. It has been proven too many times that Montana, as a whole, excels in productiveness.

We have range lands fit for the grazing of livestock only, and plenty of them. The total acreage of Montana is about 94,000,000; the farm acreage about 14,000,000. This leaves about 80,000,000 acres of open lands from which the big stockman has been compelled to withdraw, and the homesteader has not yet found himself in a financial condition to carry enough livestock to counteract the withdrawal of the large herds. Eventually, should he make a success of his homestead, he will become the owner of cattle. It is hoped and believed that sometime in the not distant future the homesteader will be a stockman.

Above, I pointed out that there are 80,000,000 vacant acres in the State of Montana. From this total there must be deducted the lands not suitable for grazing or agriculture. It has been estimated that about one-third of Montana is mountainous to such an extent that the land is not fit for either grazing of agriculture. To be conservative, say we have 50,000,000 vacant acres and that 30,000,000 of this number are fit for grazing only. For every head of cattle, horses, mules and sheep in the state, we have five acres of grazing land. This grazing land could be called upon to support them not more than seven months out of the year. Does this not show we could stand a vast increase in the numbers of our livestock?

Conditions have completely changed since the days of the strictly range business. In those days there was a question of winter feed; now it has become a question of summer feed. Today we could feed much more livestock on the ranches and farms during the winter than could be successfully run on the open range during the summer months. Where Montana used to ship all of her beef during the fall months, she now holds a great many and after being fattened during the winter they are sold in the spring. This industry has become very important in the western part of the State and in the Yellowstone valley. The ranchmen have found it the only practical way of marketing their hay.

With proper regulations pertaining to grazing lands and the present facilities for winter feeding, the State of Montana could treble its livestock holdings and probably not have enough.

It is not so much the shortage of grazing lands in Montana as the shortage of water that has caused the reduction of the herds within the State. The dry-farmer is responsible for the shortage of water in that he has seen fit, naturally, to homestead land on which there was water or adjacent to water. The result of this has been to make wide areas of grazing land without any facilities for watering stock on the range: therefore, I said that with the proper administration of the grazing land we could increase our cattle census a great deal. By proper administration, I mean provision by law or regulations by which the stockman would be given some right to make watering places on the range such as reservoirs, etc., and at the same time be given some protection for the investment necessary.

The grazing lands of the State of Montana, being mostly federal land, this problem naturally becomes a federal problem; the State, however, owns considerable land that is used for grazing purposes. The administration of these lands might be improved upon. The stockman who leases lands from the State considers it poor business if he cannot control, by his lease, about double the acreage he leases. The state law, providing for the leasing of lands, is so drawn that a stockman necessarily has to resort, to a certain extent, to sharp practice to secure any benefit from the lease. Again, like all leasers or renters, he expects to get every dollar possible out of his lease and, therefore, has no thought of the future production of the land.

The State, up to this time, has applied no conservation principles to state lands leased for grazing purposes. That this would be a paying policy is proven by the results that have been obtained on the forest reserves as they apply to grazing. Something along this line would be good policy for the State on their lands.

The State of Montana, through the agricultural college, maintains numerous dry-land experiment stations. Could it not be so arranged that a station could be maintained for the purpose of experimenting in re-seeding the State lands that are used for grazing? Such an experiment station would not entail much expense and it might be that, through such experiments, a grass could be found which would vastly increase the forage of the State grazing lands.

The prices of cattle for 1913 have been very satisfactory. While the price of beef has been about the same as 1912, the price of stock cattle has been considerably higher. It was expected by many that the new tariff bill would lower the price of cattle, but the fact that the price of stock cattle has increased during the past year, proves that the stockman is not greatly worried over the future importation of beef from the foreign countries.

What beef has come in from Argentine and Australia since the tariff on meat has been removed, has wholesaled at from only one to two cents per pound under the domestic article. This small decrease in price has not reached the consumer and all imported beef has been handled in New York and San Francisco. Its identity has been concealed and its competition in no way reduced the price of meat to the consumer.

The past consumers of Argentina and Australian beef, principally England, are still taking about all that can be produced in these cattle growing countries. The price of beef in England, during the past year, has averaged a little higher than the price of beef in Chicago. This, in itself, is very strong argument that imported beef will not injure, to any extent, the price of beef in the United States. This country has exported very few cattle during the past year. We, therefore, consume about all of the beef produced by this country; in fact, when we consider the importations of live cattle, we find the numbers considerably higher than the exportation of cattle or carcasses. At present our consumption is greater than our production. We can, therefore, welcome the importation of beef for it is the belief of many well informed stockmen that the price of cattle is high enough. Should the price go higher it would be impossible for a great many of the people to use beef and our consumption would decrease, eventually decreasing the price of cattle.

Argentine Republic, New Zealand and Australia are the only countries that export any amount of beef. All of this exportation in the past has been to Europe and it has succeeded in consuming the supply; therefore, if any of the meat producing countries should export to the United States, it means a decreased export to Europe and a raise of prices there. The margin between prices in Europe and United States is very small from the fact that the

export of beef necessarily has to follow the channel of commerce, or, in other words, the steamship lines that carry the frozen beef to the European markets must have a cargo of manufactured goods on the return trip. Until the United States has established a much greater trade with these meat producing countries, there will be no return cargo for the ships carrying frozen beef. Much of the beef that has been shipped from the Argentine to the United States since the removal of the tariff, has first been shipped to England and then to New York. It is very probable that New Zealand and Australia will ship most of the beef to the United States that we import. It is about forty days from New Zealand to England but only twenty-two day to San Francisco. The difference in distances will make considerable difference in the price delivered at the consumption point and it is all in favor of the Pacific coast of the United States.

If New Zealand and Australia ship their surplus beef to the United States instead of Europe, it will leave a larger market for the Argentine and as most of our beef from Argentine thus far has come by the way of Europe, it is natural to suppose that the United States will not receive large importations on the Atlantic side. It is also natural to suppose that on account of the shorter distance that we will receive considerable Australian and New Zealand beef. Should this prove true, Montana will lose to a certain extent, her Pacific coast market. This market has only been evident with Montana during the past few years. I think we can expect most of our shipments in the future to go to eastern markets.

There can be little reduction in the price of beef. The former meat producing countries are not the vast open range grazing areas that we have been lead to believe. The Argentine Republic produces practically all of its exported beef on alfalfa pastures, on owned land. New Zealand and Australia produce their beef in a similar way. The experience of the stockman in the western part of the United States has proven that the production of beef on owned lands is an expensive business. These same facts are true in the foreign countries and we have not, therefore, the big, free, open, range to contend with in the production of beef nor much less cost per animal in such production.

The Secretary of Agriculture sent Dr. Melvin to Argentine for the purpose of investigating the beef production of Argentine and its possible effect upon the reduction of the cost of living in the United States, with beef imported free of duty. Dr. Melvin's report is, in short, that the cost of the production in Argentine and the cost of production in the United States is so nearly the same that we can expect little reduction in the prices of meat from Argentine imports. The Secretary of Agriculture is of the opinion that any appreciable decrease in the prices of meat in the United States must come from the increase in the production of United States and the adjoining countries of Mexico and Canada. It seems quite reasonable to believe that the stockman is going to receive practically the present prices until we increase our production.

In my report of 1912, I mentioned the fact that the Board of Stock Commissioners, in conjunction with the Montana Stock Growers' Association, was endeavoring to secure a lower livestock rate within the state of Montana. I am glad to report that such a reduction has been gained. The old rate was based upon \$38.00 per car per hundred miles. The new rate is based upon \$30.00 per car per hundred miles. In the new rate it is also a graduation and rate fixed by ten mile divisions. The old rate did not have this graduation except by fifty mile divisions, for the first few hundred miles, and thereafter, one hundred mile divisions. This rate was secured at a conference called by the State Railroad Commission with the representatives of the railroads. I take this means of thanking the Railroad Commission for their assistance and final adjustment; also, A. E. de Ricgles deserves equal mention for his

work in securing these rates. The stockmen of Montana should inform themselves concerning this rate and secure its benefits.

I wish to call attention to another matter referred to in my 1912 report, and bearing upon the alleged shortage of a former secretary, the late W. G. Preuitt. I said, "The \$2,000 unaccounted for at the time Mr. W. G. Preuitt succeeded Mr. Harrison is a matter that would justify further investigation." The investigating Committee of the Board of Stock Commissioners which was appointed by the 1911 session, in making their final report to the Governor, during the 1913 session, asserted that Mr. W. G. Preuitt had "appropriated to his own use" \$2,000 of the Board's money. This accusation had also been made in their October, 1912, partial report. The special accountant, representing the Investigating Committee, it seems could find no accounting of this \$2,000 received.

This was the first money received by Mr. Preuitt when he took office and he held the office of secretary for many years and until his death. It seems unreasonable to believe that Mr. Preuitt would appropriate this amount, the first money received, to his own use and in all the years following account for every cent. It also seems impossible from the character and standing of Mr. Preuitt, that he would ever appropriate any money for his own use which did not properly belong to him. With this in mind, as soon as I could secure the detailed report of the accountant for the Investigating Committee. I examined the report, together with the books for my personal satisfaction and discovered what I believed to be the explanation of the alleged shortage.

After this discovery, I called in Mr. E. K. Preuitt and explained the matter to him. He immediately secured the services of Mr. J. C. Ricker, an accredited accountant. After a thorough examination of the books, Mr. Ricker proved the alleged shortage was an unjust accusation. There were checks for estrays, signed by Mr. Preuitt in the records of the office and in the possession of the Investigating Committee, accounting for every cent of the alleged shortage. These checks and Mr. Ricker's report were placed before the Investigation Committee and it was seemingly proven to their satisfaction that no such shortage existed. They have not seen fit, however, to make any public statement, rescinding their unjust accusation or made any attempt to clear the name of W. G. Preuitt of the alleged shortage. A full report by Mr. Ricker, together with a description of the checks, has been filed in the Governor's office.







81-5-112. Permit system for transportation of sheep –penalty (went into effect Jan. 1990).

(1) The department shall adopt rules imposing a permit system for the transportation of sheep within or out of the state if it finds that a permit system is necessary to prevent theft of sheep. The rules must establish fees commensurate with the department's cost of operating the permit system.

(2) A person who purposely or knowingly transports sheep in violation of rules adopted under subsection (1) is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or imprisonment in the county jail for a term not exceeding 6 months, or both.




